In 1893, a 17-year-old Japanese student, Yone Noguchi, dropped out of university and decided to live in America. He became a pioneering Asian American author, writing poems, essays, and novels in English. In his novel *The American Diary of a Japanese Girl*, he provides an account of his arrival in America in the voice of a Japanese teenage girl, Miss Morning Glory. Three presenters from three different countries will discuss Noguchi's fascinatingly complex gender and cultural identities and consider the significance of his life and work today.
